### Tessa Jetson

**Topic:** Mothers Can Change the Destiny of their Children's life

Tessa has empowered thousands to overcome limiting beliefs, negative mindsets, and procrastination, helping them pursue their dreams. Despite early business and professional success, her life took a dramatic turn at 26 when she and her three young children sought refuge from family violence.

Tessa highlighted the profound physical and emotional harm children face in violent households, underscoring the need for mothers to prioritise their safety. Inspired by her children, she rebuilt her life with a focus on stability and financial independence. Today, as founder and CEO of the Tessa Jetson Foundation and the Restart Your Life program, Tessa empowers others to achieve lasting transformation.

## Dr John Bellavance

**Topic:** The Foundations of a Good Marriage

Dr. John Bellavance, Vice-President of the Universal Peace Federation Australia, delivered insightful presentations on two critical topics during the seminar.

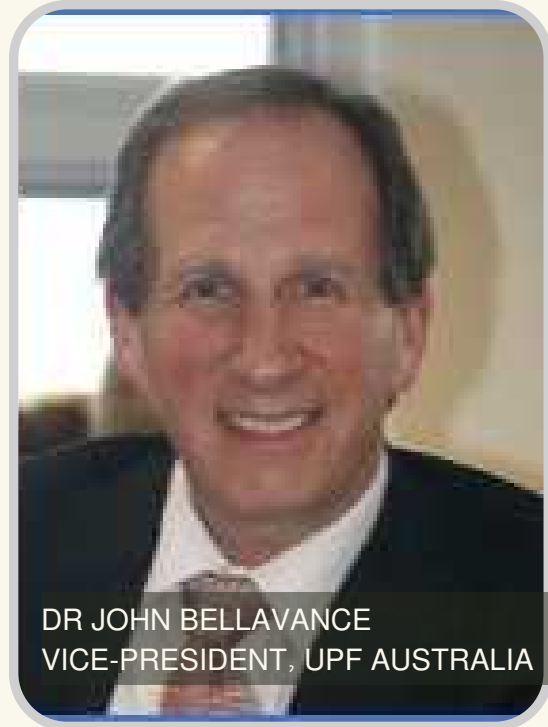
One presentation addressed sexual ethics and its influence on attitudes towards women. Dr. Bellavance highlighted how popular culture significantly distorts the understanding of gender roles, equality, and sexuality. Sexualised media

messages perpetuate harmful stereotypes, pressuring young people to define their value through physical desirability.

He emphasised that such trends displace young men and women from their authentic selves and contribute to the troubling reality that 1 in 9 girls and 1 in 53 boys experience sexual abuse or assault before the age of 18. Dr. Bellavance stressed the vital role families and society play in instilling values and guiding adolescents toward healthy, responsible attitudes about sexuality. These efforts are essential to addressing the root causes of family violence.

He also outlined five essential practices to remedy family violence within marriages:

1. Love – Treating one’s spouse with the utmost respect and care, akin to royalty.
2. Commitment – Prioritising dedication to the relationship.
3. Self-Management – Cultivating emotional maturity and self-control.
4. Understanding and Support – Knowing one’s spouse deeply and encouraging their aspirations.
5. Gender Equality – Embracing and practicing equitable beliefs and behaviours.





## Miranda Wills

**Topic:** Self-Love Ends Family Violence

Miranda Wills, a certified Transformational Coach through the Global Coaching Institute and a graduate of Melbourne Business School's Mindful Leadership program, is dedicated to heart-led leadership and trust-building. She combines professional expertise with profound personal resilience, having found inner peace after enduring family violence.

In her journey, Miranda courageously confronted and healed from childhood trauma, including experiences of incest. Through a deep spiritual awakening, she discovered the transformative power of self-love. Miranda advocates that self-love is key to reshaping family dynamics, fostering safety, respect, and compassion. By healing past wounds, embracing self-compassion, and recognising our intrinsic worth, individuals can break cycles of conflict and pain.

She emphasises moving beyond limiting beliefs and reconnecting with a loving, higher nature that empowers intentional, peaceful interactions. This approach not only heals but creates environments where love, peace, and understanding thrive—paving the way for breaking cycles of violence once and for all.





## Anne Bellavance

**Topic:** Advocating for the Implementation of Clare’s Law Nationally



Domestic violence is a pervasive issue impacting millions across Australia, requiring urgent and proactive solutions. In response, the Women’s Federation for World Peace Australia and its co-partners are advocating for the implementation of Clare’s Law across all States and Territories. Clare’s Law is formally known as the Domestic Violence Disclosure Scheme (DVDS). This law provides individuals with the legal right to access a partner’s history of domestic violence, equipping them with potentially life-saving information.

### Why Clare’s Law?

Named after Clare Wood, a UK domestic violence victim, Clare’s Law has been successfully implemented in the United Kingdom, New Zealand, and several Canadian provinces. It offers a vital pathway for individuals to learn about a partner’s violent history, enabling informed decisions to protect themselves and their families. With one in six Australian women experiencing physical or sexual violence by a partner since the age of 15, the need for preventive measures like Clare’s Law is undeniable.

Anne calls on all individuals and organisations to join this critical campaign, working together to make Clare’s Law (DVDS) a reality across Australia.

## Tendai Togara

**Topic:** The Role of Faith in Women's Lives in Creating Loving Families

Tendai is a leadership development coach and consultant at Leading Impact Now, committed to creating inclusive and equitable organisations. She is also the founder of Found by Grace Ministries; a platform dedicated to empowering women to embrace their God-given purpose and transform from victims to victors. Her vision focuses on cultivating female leaders who embody strength, wisdom, and purpose.



Tendai highlighted the vital role of empowering women to discover their purpose and grow in wisdom, emphasising that their unique ability to nurture and influence shapes healthy families and communities, with an impact that resonates across generations.

## Bridging Divides Annual Symposium

- TONGAN AND COOK ISLAND CULTURAL DANCE PERFORMANCES WERE KEY HIGHLIGHTS FOR GUESTS.
- TO CONCLUDE THE EVENT, PARTICIPANTS TOOK PART IN A BRIDGE OF PEACE CEREMONY.



On Saturday 26 October, the New Zealand chapter of the WFWP held their Annual Symposium in Auckland, New Zealand. The event began with a karakia (prayer) by a local community representative. Matapa Shelley the Chapter President emceed the event, welcoming around 60 attendees.

Speeches were heard from influential women; Mrs. Lotu Fuli, Suanoamaali'i Dr. Karanina Sumeo, Mrs. Anne Pala, Mrs. Ruth Clever and Mrs. Anne Bellavance, on topics such as; peace and unity, cultural understanding and healing historic wounds. The aim of the "Bridging Divides" conference was to foster understanding and collaboration across socio-economic, cultural, racial, and historical divides. It sought to empower individuals, especially women, to act as agents of change in their communities by promoting peace, equality, and unity.

In between speeches, a Tongan dance was performed by Anna Pogoni and Rachel Afu, daughters of two WFWP members. Later, a beautiful Cook Island dance was performed by Matapa Shelley's daughters. These performances not only enriched the event but also showcased the vibrant cultural diversity and the power of the arts in bringing people together.



The event held a Q&A session and lunch. Then, to conclude the event joyfully, participants took part in a bridge of peace ceremony to the beautiful singing of Jessa Verdadero. The key takeaway was the importance of collective action, understanding, and forgiveness in overcoming divisions and creating a more harmonious society.

## PRESENTERS

### Mrs. Lotu Fuli

Mrs. Lotu Fuli is a politician and Auckland City councillor. Previously serving as a Manukau Ward councillor and a previous member and chair of the Ōtara-Papatoetoe Local Board. Active in community advocacy since 2013, she has focused on issues such as public resource management and local governance, particularly in representing South Auckland's diverse population. Her efforts often highlight education, social welfare, and infrastructure improvements within her community.

In her speech, she spoke about bridging socio-economic divides in South Auckland. Mrs. Fuli emphasised the role of women as allies in fostering peace and unity.



### Saunoamaali'i Dr. Karanina Sumeo



Saunoamaali'i Dr. Karanina Sumeo is the Equal Employment Opportunities Commissioner for the New Zealand Human Rights Commission. Originally from Samoa, she has been a strong advocate for social justice, focusing on closing pay disparities and addressing discrimination, particularly for Pacific women, ethnic minorities, and vulnerable workers in New Zealand. With a background spanning chemistry, social work, and child abuse prevention, Dr. Sumeo continues to champion equity and human rights across diverse socio-economic sectors.



Saunoamaali'i Dr. Karanina Sumeo spoke to the audience about addressing socio-economic disparities, highlighting the importance of equality, the impact of racial discrimination, and the Human Rights Act. She discussed upcoming "modern slavery" legislation and the need for fair justice access.

**Mrs. Anne Pala**



MRS. ANNE PALA (RIGHT)

Mrs. Anne Pala (right) is a community advocate recognised for her work supporting ethnic minorities, women, and children in New Zealand. She was awarded the Queen's Service Medal in 2008 for her contributions to ethnic communities, reflecting her decades-long engagement in social leadership roles, including serving as the first woman president of the Waitakere Ethnic Board and working with the Ethnic People's Advisory Panel. Mrs. Pala has also been involved with organisations promoting diversity, safety, and community welfare, emphasising public policy, governance, and intercultural advocacy.

In her talk she discussed overcoming cultural barriers, emphasising civic engagement and cultural understanding.

**Mrs. Ruth Clever**

Mrs. Ruth Clever became a member of the Unification Movement in the USA. She has been involved as a volunteer in interfaith work for over 30 years both in the USA and NZ, including as a founding member of Auckland Inter-Faith Council where she served as Treasurer for 7 years and as President for 12 years. She was a founding member of the Inter-religious and International Federation for World Peace (now known as the Universal Peace Federation) in New Zealand;

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Saunoamaali'i Dr. Karanina Sumeo spoke to the audience about addressing socio-economic disparities, highlighting the importance of equality, the impact of racial discrimination, and the Human Rights Act. She discussed upcoming "modern slavery" legislation and the need for fair justice access and was a founding member and first chairwoman of the Women's Federation for World Peace (NZ). She was employed as a trusts administrator in an accounting firm for 20 years but is now retired.

Mrs. Ruth Cleaver shared her experiences in healing historical wounds, drawing on insights from interactions with Holocaust descendants. She stressed the value of education, apology, and forgiveness as tools for healing.

Hello! My name is Florence Anne Liliu, and I'm currently a student study at the Solomon Island National University (SINU). As I continue on my educational journey, I am excited to share the courses I undertook during my second semester classes of 2024.

## DIPLOMA IN SECONDARY TEACHING AT SOLOMON ISLANDS NATIONAL UNIVERSITY




This is my second semester study report on my progress at the Solomon Islands National University (SINU). I am deeply grateful for your continued support, which has enabled me to pursue my studies with dedication. Below, I provide a detailed overview of my coursework and progress this semester and an overall summary of my journey so far.

Since the start of my studies in 2023, I have completed a total of 15 units out of the 19 required for my Diploma in Secondary Teaching. This means I have four units remaining, which I plan to complete in 2025 to fulfil all the requirements for my diploma. The knowledge and skills I have gained through these units have been helpful. They have not only deepened my understanding of education, history, and ethics but have also improved my confidence in taking on leadership roles in my future teaching career.

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In my second semester this year, I enrolled in four units:

1

SSR602: Christian Worship, in this unit, I studied the theology of worship, focusing on the differences between worship practices in the Old Testament and the New Testament. I gained a deeper understanding of the types and significance of worship during these two eras and how they shape Christian worship today.

2

HIS602: Church Histories, This unit explored how Christianity arrived in the Solomon Islands through European missionaries during the colonial era. I learned about the challenges and contributions of these missionaries and how their efforts laid the foundation for the growth of churches in the region.

3

SNU600: Ethics, This course examined ethical and unethical behavior, as well as moral and immoral actions. It has equipped me with the skills to make sound, ethical decisions in my personal and professional life.

4

EDU603: Curriculum and Assessment, This unit focused on curriculum development and student assessment techniques. I learned how to design effective curricula and use various assessment tools to evaluate student learning outcomes. This knowledge is vital for my future teaching career.

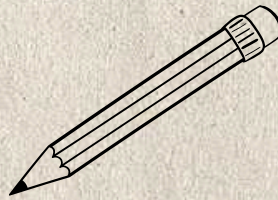
These courses have significantly contributed to my academic and professional development, preparing me for my role as a teacher and a school chaplain.

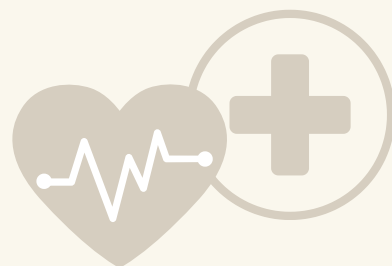
# ANDREA DERBY: SCHOLARSHIP RECIPIENT

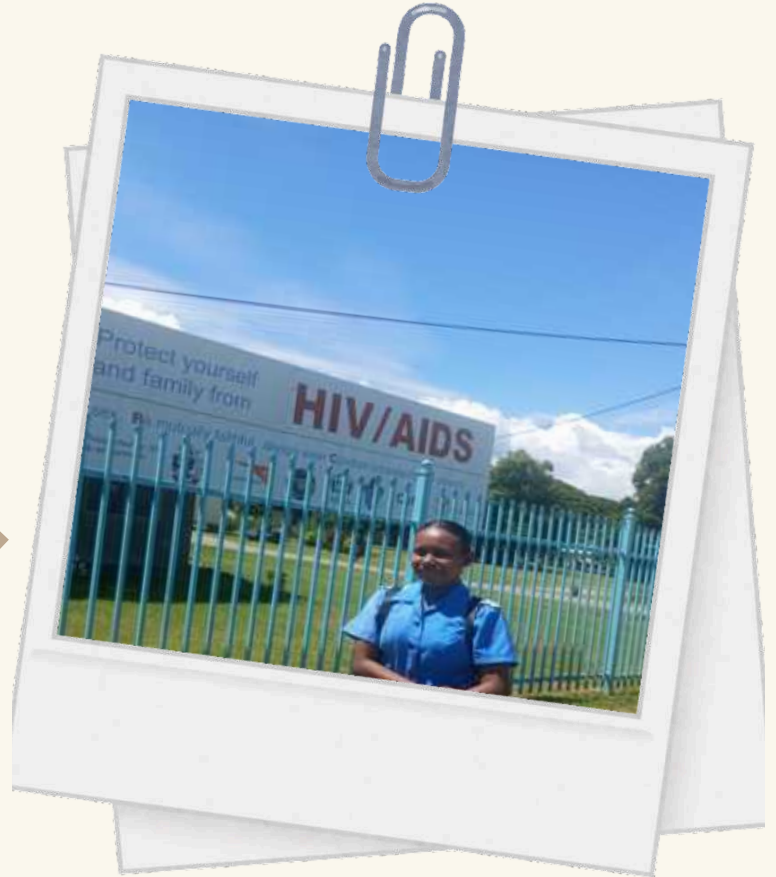
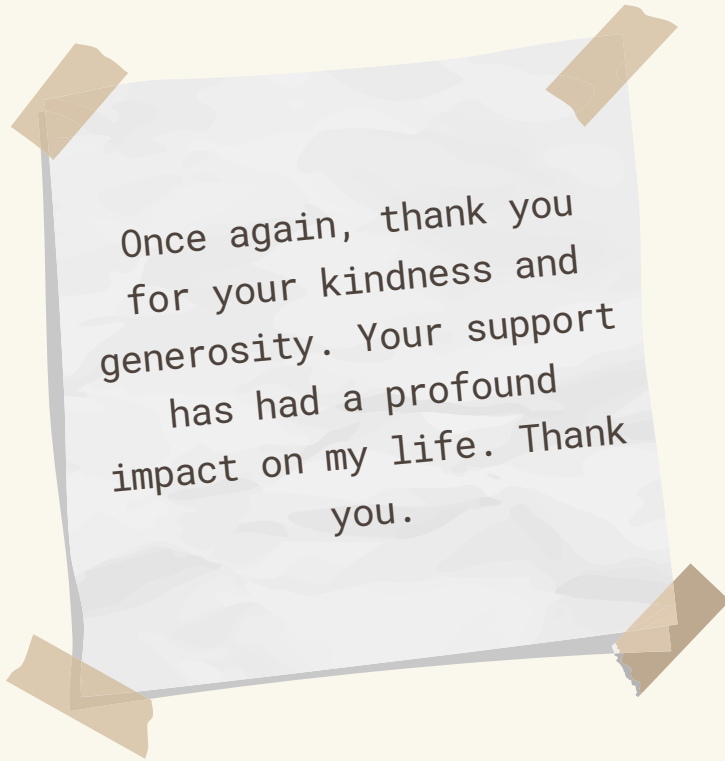

- LOOKING AHEAD, WFWP BOHOL IS HOPEFUL TO EXPAND ITS OUTREACH AND IMPACT, WITH PLANS FOR WORKSHOPS, TRAINING PROGRAMS, AND COMMUNITY-BUILDING ACTIVITIES ALREADY UNDERWAY.

On September 29, 2024, the Women’s Federation for World Peace (WFWP) Bohol Chapter had the privilege of hosting a meaningful visit from distinguished international and national leaders. Mrs. Anne Bellavance, International Vice President of WFWP Asia Pacific 2, together with her spouse, Dr. John Bellavance, Vice-President of the Universal Peace Federation (UPF) Australia, journeyed to the island province of Bohol. Accompanying them were Mrs. Almera Grace Mayo, President of WFWP Philippines, and her husband, Mr. Eduard Mayo.



The delegation was warmly welcomed by Ms. Christine Rose Bulayo, Chapter President of WFWP Bohol, alongside her team. This visit was more than just a formal occasion; it marked a significant milestone for the local chapter, offering a valuable opportunity to exchange ideas, share local initiatives, and receive insights from highly respected WFWP leaders.

Central to the day’s activities was a heartfelt sharing session, where WFWP Bohol members shared stories about their local challenges and achievements. Mrs. Bellavance and Mrs. Mayo, both highly experienced leaders within the organisation, provided invaluable guidance and wisdom. Drawing from their experiences with other successful WFWP chapters across the Asia Pacific region, they emphasised the core values of unity, sisterhood, and collaboration. Their insights resonated deeply with the WFWP Bohol members, who were encouraged to further



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strengthen their local efforts. Additionally, the meeting included discussions on improving the organizational structure of WFWP Philippines, with both international and local leaders agreeing on the need to build a more cohesive network of chapters throughout the country.



One of the highlights of the visit was the tour of the Permaculture Training Hub, a significant project currently under construction in Bohol. This hub is a major undertaking for the WFWP Bohol Chapter, as it will serve as a training center for women and youth in regenerative and sustainable agricultural practices. Once completed, the facility will offer permaculture courses designed

to promote environmental sustainability and equip participants with practical skills they can implement in their communities, contributing to local food security and sustainable development.

Following the tour, the WFWP delegation engaged in a pivotal meeting with local government officials from the Municipality of Carmen, Bohol. In attendance were Municipal Mayor Conchita Toribio Delos Reyes, Municipal Agriculturist Arlene Cabusao, and the Municipal Head of the Department of Women and Children, Jocelyn Sombrio. This meeting provided a platform for discussing collaborative efforts between WFWP and the local government. The municipal officials expressed strong support for WFWP's initiatives, recognising the organisation's potential to drive meaningful change in the province. Mayor Che expressed openness to future collaborations, noting the alignment of WFWP's mission with the municipality's ongoing efforts to improve community well-being.

Ms. Bulayo and the WFWP Bohol team expressed heartfelt gratitude for the presence and guidance of Bellavance couple and Mayo couple. The exchange of ideas, experiences, and strategies left all participants feeling inspired and ready to pursue new initiatives with renewed energy.



Looking ahead, WFWP Bohol is hopeful to expand its outreach and impact, with plans for workshops, training programs, and community-building activities already underway. During this visit, WFWP Bohol also had the opportunity to highlight the province’s natural beauty, including its rich marine life and unique geological formations. United by a shared vision and a strong support network, WFWP Bohol is eager to continue paving the way toward a more harmonious and sustainable future for the province and beyond.

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# The Digital Bridges for Peace: A Symposium on Global Peace and Reconciliation

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## PRESENTERS

**Ms. Sua Han** - *The Global Significance of Korean Unification: Advancing Peace and Prosperity on a Global Scale*



Ms. Sua Han has a Ph.D. in North Korean Studies from Dongguk University. Her professional experience includes being Director General of the Women's Federation for World Peace and at Ewha Woman's University Department of Social Welfare. Ms. Sua Hua is now Chairperson of the Gangdong-gu Council in Seoul and Director of the Democratic and Peaceful Unification Advisory Council. In 2017, she received the Presidential Commendation Award for the Civilian

Unification Movement and again in 2022 for Peaceful Unification Activities.

Ms. Sua Han delivered a short talk on the topic, "The Global Significance of Korean Unification: Advancing Peace and Prosperity on a Global Scale". Ms. Han Sua's presentation explored the Korean Peninsula's division since WWII, marked by the Korean War and North Korea's recent policies to preserve its cultural identity. It highlighted how North Korea enforced cultural protection laws, such as the Pyongyang Language Protection Act, while focusing on the broader implications of regional cooperation organisations like the EU, OAU, and ASEAN post-Cold War. The vision for a unified Korea centres on building mutual trust, strengthening international cooperation, and fostering diplomacy to create a peaceful Korean Peninsula that contributes meaningfully to a global peace community.

**Ms. Anne Bellavance** - *Great Leaders are Masters who Rewrite Futures and Transform How Situations Occur*



Ms. Anne Bellavance is an educator, not-for-profit pioneer, environmental scientist and volunteer with over 40 years of experience in Australia, the U.S., and Canada. Anne is dedicated to establishing a 'culture of heart' based on the motto 'Living for the Sake of Others,' reflecting the core values of the Women's Federation for World Peace International. Anne spends a significant amount of time supporting and mentoring women and networking with community organisations. Through the Global

Women's Peace Network, she emphasises leadership, family education, and environmental stewardship.

Ms. Anne Bellavance delivered a short talk on the topic, "Great Leaders are Masters who Rewrite Futures and Transform How Situations Occur". One of the highlights of her lecture was the activity and steps on how to become masters of ourselves and our situations by

understanding the past, analysing the present, and planning for the future. She highlighted how the youth should have the power to hold and navigate their lives.



**Ms. Patricia Nicole G. Uy** - *Youth as Catalysts for Peace: Empowering the Next Generation to Foster Harmony in the Digital Age*



Ms. Patricia Nicole G. Uy is an alumna of the Ateneo de Manila University, where she graduated with Cum Laude distinction in Computer Science, with a specialisation in Data Science and Analytics and attained a double degree in Digital Game Design and Development. She received the Samsung Research Excellence Awards for Outstanding Academic Performance and Research, with both of her thesis papers being published in renowned journals; the Philippine

Computing Science Congress and the Philippine Information Technology Journal special issue on Serious Games.

Nicole has also moderated a panel for Girls in AI during the ASEAN Girls in ICT Policy Summit 2023 supported by the ITU and was a panellist during the ASEAN Youth Dialogue 2023. Her understanding of emerging trends as well as her unique position as a young woman government representative in the field of technology coupled with her background in computer science and the start-up industry has set her as an upcoming exceptional young woman leader at the forefront of her field.

Ms. Uy delivered a short talk on the topic, “Youth as Catalysts for Peace: Empowering the Next Generation to Foster Harmony in the Digital Age”. Being the youngest among the speakers, Ms. Patricia Nicole Uy instantly built a connection with the young audience. Her talk highlighted how the youth can use digital platforms to foster harmonious spaces. She also advised the participants of the dangers within the cyber world. Ms. Uy highlighted digital vigilance in using the internet in order to avoid scams or getting hacked.

**Ms. Christine Miles A. Laberinto-Miranda** - *Connecting Communities: Leveraging Digital Platforms for Global Peace and Harmony*

As the Officer-in-Charge, Ms. Christine Miles A. Laberinto-Miranda leads and oversees the implementation of ICT Industry development programs including the Digital Cities Program for the IT BPM Industry EDGE PH Program. She has also worked as a Freelance writer for Filipino artists under the DF Art Agency, the Leon Art Gallery, and Metro Gallery. She earned her Master’s Degree in Community Development from the



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University of the Philippines Diliman, and earned her Bachelor's degree in Journalism from the University of Santo Tomas where she graduated as Cum Laude.

Ms. Laberinto-Miranda delivered a short talk on the topic, "Connecting Communities: Leveraging Digital Platforms for Global Peace and Harmony". She created an opportunity for participants to get to know the online professional communities that they could join. Ms. Laberinto-Christine also highlighted how the Philippine Government, through the Department of Information and Communications Technology, raises digital job opportunities for the Filipino people, especially in the countryside.

### **Dr. Florida C. Labuguen - *Promoting Peace and Strengthening Communities through Collaborative Efforts***



Dr. Florida C. Labuguen is a highly respected figure in the field of education in the Philippines. With her extensive experience and dedication to nurturing young minds, she has made significant contributions to the development of the National Service Training Program (NSTP) in the country. Dr. Labuguen served at the Technological University of the Philippines-Manila as the former Director of the National Service Training Program, Vice President for Academia and Finance, and she also stood as a former OIC University President.

Dr. Labuguen delivered a short talk on the topic, "Promoting Peace and Strengthening Communities through Collaborative Efforts". Dr. Labuguen had a very interactive lecture encouraging the participants to do some icebreakers and even sing. She focused on how families, as the smallest unit of the community, are the foundation of a peaceful community and nation as a whole. Dr. Labuguen also asked the participants to participate in a poll where she challenged them to fulfill their chosen advocacy or strategy to promote peace in their communities.

On 16 November 2024, 70 volunteers came together for the Giving Back! Youth Community Service project held along Rantau Panjang Road in Teluk Panglima Garang, Selangor. Jointly organised by WFWP Malaysia and the Kuala Langat Constituency Service Centre, the event united students from University Tunku Abdul Rahman (UTAR), University Malaya (UM), and villagers from the local community to clean up the village premises.

Mr. Haridass Ramasamy, Parliament Coordinating Officer for Kuala Langat, commended WFWP for coordinating this meaningful project and emphasised the importance of helping one another, regardless of racial and cultural differences to build a harmonious community.

Mdm. Lina Cheng, President of WFWP Malaysia, thanked the volunteers and highlighted the importance of volunteerism. She said, “this is a great opportunity to learn from one another, gain valuable experience, and contribute to the community.”

Mr. Badrul Idzman bin Ahmad Latipi, the village chief, divided the participants into four groups and assigned tasks to them. Each team was led by a village committee member. Together, the volunteers cleaned 12 villagers' compounds, picked up trash, and cleared drains to prevent clogging and flooding. Volunteers worked hard under the hot sun to remove plastic bottles, wrappers, and other waste trapped in bushes and drains.

The closing remarks by Mr. Lai Peng Keong, Secretary-General of UPF Malaysia, reinforced the event's commitment to building a more inclusive and harmonious world. Overall, the "Building Bridges for Peace" event was a great success in advancing the shared mission of peace, collaboration, and empowerment.
