Clean Up Australia Day

WFWP Victoria and UPF Victoria volunteers, along with family and friends, gathered at Apex Park, Belgrave, to connect with the local community and champion sustainability. Clean Up Australia Day was more than just an opportunity to restore the environment—it was a meaningful way to bring people together, strengthen community bonds, and promote collective responsibility for a cleaner, greener future.



Under the WFWP marquee, enthusiastic volunteers formed teams and set out to clean up the community. They collected rubbish and recyclable items along the Puffing Billy and Belgrave Station walkways, behind the township's shops, and along major arterial roads. This year, WFWP partnered with Yarra Ranges Council, which generously collected the bags of waste at no charge, further supporting our shared commitment to a cleaner, greener environment.

This year Clean Up Australia marked its 35th year of beautifying Australia. Clean Up Australia Day, established

in 1990, has grown into the nation's largest community-based environmental event, with over 22 million Australians participating since its inception. In 2024, more than 750,000 volunteers engaged in over 10,000 clean-up sites nationwide, demonstrating a robust commitment to environmental stewardship.

Australians produce approximately 540 kilograms of household waste per person annually, equating to over 10 kilograms each week. Of the estimated 67 million tonnes of waste generated in 2017, only 37 million tonnes were recycled, leaving 21.7 million tonnes disposed of in landfill. Additionally, about 130,000 tonnes of Australian plastic end up in waterways and oceans each year. [www.cleanup.org.au]

These statistics underscore the significant waste challenges faced in Australia and highlight the critical role of community initiatives like Clean Up Australia Day in addressing environmental pollution.

Unfortunately, single-use plastic water bottles, soft drink cans, fast-food containers, and plastic wrappers are often discarded out of car windows by passing drivers. Train station pathways, underpasses, and stairways tend to accumulate significant litter, as people carelessly leave their waste behind rather than disposing of it responsibly.

As the day progressed, it was truly inspiring to see everyone step up and take action to make a difference.

Volunteers returned for a well-earned break, enjoying a complimentary BBQ lunch while reflecting on their efforts. A rewarding day with a meaningful impact!

Twenty volunteers gathered for a Chinese New Year celebration at Hati Mesra Elderly Care Centre on 8 February 2025. The visit, organised by Women's Federation for World Peace Malaysia (WFWP) and supported by Universal Peace Federation Malaysia, brought festive joy and fostered intergenerational bonding. The home also received a wheelchair, disability equipment, groceries, and necessities for its 20 elderly residents.

Mdm. Ng, who runs the home, provided an overview of its operations, challenges faced by the residents, and the importance of community involvement. A brief tour of the facility allowed volunteers to better understand the living environment and needs of the elderly.

WFWP Malaysia president Mdm. Lina Cheng, who kickstarted the event with a speech, expressed her gratitude to the volunteers, donors, and supporters. She emphasised the importance of showing care and respect for the elderly and encouraged participants to continue fostering a spirit of love and service in their daily lives.



The visit was filled with interactive activities that created a lively and warm atmosphere. Volunteers engaged the elderly in fun games, including a gift-passing activity and an action-based game. The laughter and joy were evident as residents actively participated. Music brought everyone together as volunteers and residents sang nostalgic songs that lifted their spirits and created a heart-warming ambience. A special highlight was the distribution of angpows to the residents.

Volunteers and residents also shared a meal together, strengthening the bond between generations. Volunteers as well as residents found the visit enriching and rewarding, successfully embodying the Chinese New Year festive mood — unity,

kindness, and gratitude.


